

1. From the President

Which means of course that preparations are already underway for Late-night Christmas Shopping — this year on **Wednesday 3rd December**. 4. Late-night Christmas Shopping

A further reminder that the annual Late-night Christmas Shopping event, organised each year by the Chamber of Trade committee, will take place on **Wednesday 3rd December** this year. The format will be very similar to previous years, which have invariably been huge successes. Despite intervention by the weather mid-evening last year it was still a marvellous occasion with an amazing number of people, including lots of families, turning out in support of the event.

The evening kicks-off with the official switch-on of the Christmas Tree Lights in Hall Square at 5:30pm by our Guest Celebrity (to be finalised) accompanied by the Town's Mayor, Cllr Pauline Phillips. We are fortunate to have three school choirs performing for us again this year – Boroughbridge Primary, Roecliffe Primary and Boroughbridge High. All three choirs gave wonderful performances last year and we're very much looking forward to this year's offerings. We may also have one or two community choirs singing for us again, but that still has to be confirmed.

Boroughbridge Lions will have Santa and his Sleigh on display, and we'll have a number of stalls from several local Community Groups. Mike Collins' Scout group will be in Hall Square with their famous Roast Chestnuts stall, alongside the ever-popular Mulled Wine stall organised by Boroughbridge Community Charity.

The Shop Window Display competition theme this year is "Winter

Wonderland" which should provide a nice broad canvass for creativity, so we're hoping for lots of participating businesses. They will be competing for the much-coveted Trophy, won last year by Treharne's Pharmacy (see some of the team at right receiving the Trophy from the



Mayor and Chamber President). This year it will again be our Guest Celebrity and the Mayor with the onerous task of judging the competition.

5. Proposed Housing Developments Update

Further to our report on this issue in the May Chamber Chat, both the Gladman (250 Houses) and Miller Homes Developments (167 Houses) off Leeming Lane are now on the North Yorks Planning Portal. The closing date for objections to the Gladman development was the beginning of

Sept, and the date for the Miller Homes is 11th Oct. There are currently lots of complaints including from the Police and North Yorkshire Water!

It is likely that delays may come due to recent findings. Archaeologists mapping the Gladman proposed housing development site north of Hockley Croft have identified an ancient Romano-British settlement extending across almost the whole site.

The outline and features of the settlement, including fields, roads and possible buildings, can be clearly seen marked in red on the picture below.



The North Yorkshire Council Heritage team has said in their consultation response to the Gladman planning application that extensive trial-trenching to explore the site's archaeology is required before their planning application can be determined because the site may contain monuments of national significance.

As events at the proposed Kirby Hill MSA site north-west of the village have shown, archaeology in such a sensitive historic area cannot be done quickly or cheaply. Developers must treat the long history of our community with respect and commit the time and money to properly explore and document it.

6. Snippets

You may recall from the June issue of Chamber Chat that the Mayor (Cllr Pauline Philips) and Chamber President Derek Hufton were interviewed for a forthcoming episode of the popular BBC TV programme **Escape To**The Country. Well, the programme duly screened on Monday 15th

September and it included a small feature on Boroughbridge with the

The **Coco & Bear** shop on Horsefair will be closing shortly. Apparently the owner is shortly to commence maternity leave and the Boroughbridge shop will be permanently closing to coincide.

Many of you will already know that the former Winearray premises at 36 High Street are now occupied by **Kurdish Cut** barbers. While the Chamber has no issue with legitimate businesses within our Town Centre we are aware of some disquiet amongst local residents who don't feel this an appropriate business for our High Street asking why the Chamber does not do something about it. The arrangement is solely between the Landlord and the Tenant of course.
